Issue

Children who are not proficient in reading by the end of third grade are four times more likely to drop out of high school than proficient readers.



Solution

United Way of the Capital Region's School Readiness Program strives to improve reading proficiency by preparing children for kindergarten.



Results

65% of participants in kindergarten

are proficient in reading versus **44%** of their peers not in the program.

58% of participants in first grade

are proficient in reading versus **35%** of their peers not in the program.

65% of participants in second grade

are proficient in reading versus **36%** of their peers not in the program.

55% of participants in third grade

are proficient in reading versus **31%** of their peers not in the program.

61% of participants scored proficient in reading*

on the PSSA test versus **20%** of their peers not in the program.

* PSSA data is for five reporting districts (Cumberland Valley, Harrisburg, Mechanicsburg, Newport and West Perry).

Preparing Children for School



We engage families to prepare children academically and socially for kindergarten by:

- Connecting families to affordable preschool (if available).
- Helping families needing tuition assistance.
- Connecting families with early intervention and support services.
- Holding free education workshops.
- Registering students for kindergarten.

PROGRAM OUTPUTS

1,051 children
enrolled in preschools

69,133 individuals
have participated in
4,703 workshops.

1,142 students
were registered
on-time for kindergarten.



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Through our work with community partners, we work to increase the number of children ready for school, and the reading proficiency of third grade students, which increases their chances of high school graduation.
